I hope you have all had a wonderful start to the school year! Hannah, Judd, and I, would like to genuinely thank each and everyone of you for being so accommodating, patient, and understanding as we have gotten referral meetings underway - a record number of 32! Speech schedules should now be finalized, except for minor glitches that we will continue to work through! We want to thank all administrators, teachers, nurses, and parents for your participation in the referral process. Thank you to all of our Special Education teachers, ESL, Reading Interventionists and Math Coach for coordinating with us on schedules to make sure all of our students receive the services they need in order to succeed.

I would also like to touch on the referral process. Please remember, that in order for a student to qualify under the Alabama Administrative Code to receive speech services, we have to have substantial data and evidence that the speech/language disorder is adversely affecting the student academically and/or socially. As much as we wish we could serve every student with a speech sound error, we have to prioritize the students who are suffering academically and/or socially due to it. When you are considering referring a student for testing - please consider the following:

Adverse Educational Impact

Impact is on student – not family or teacher

Academic

- Grades
- Difficulty with school work

Functional/ Social/ Emotional/ Behavioral

- Ability to interact in school setting is impacted
- Emotional state impacts ability to participate
- Behaviors impact ability to par-

Documenting educational impact using data sources such as:

- Academic activities (homework, journals, work samples, classroom tests, etc.)
- Articulation errors reflected in spelling? Poor intelligibility?
- Language impacting performance?
- Data from responses to strategies already used by teachers? (MTSS, Rtl and IDEA pre-referral intervention)
- Social emotional challenges in the school setting?
- Behavioral impact in school setting?

- 1. Document, Document, and Document.
- 2. Educators be sure to communicate with parents. Parents want to be informed in regards to the child's educational process.
- 3. Attend IEP meetings and be a part of meeting(s). Provide insight and details regarding the student. Stay the entire meeting.
- 4. Be Proactive and make arrangements to have someone cover your duties, etc. in case you are involved in a meeting.
- 5. Make sure to collaborate, communicate, and involve your co-teacher in the instructional process. Divide and conquer so that ALL students are receiving a level educational experience.
- 6. The IEP is a living breathing document. Be sure that all students are receiving accommodations/ interventions.
- 7. Remember the referral process is to keep the student out of special education; during this process you are providing interventions/ accommodations to help the student master the goals/ task(s) within your courses.
- 8. There will be some PD coming for Special Educators to review the following: IEP writing, Co- Teaching Tips, Forms to help with Communication and Documentation, and Ways to become an Effective Special Educator
